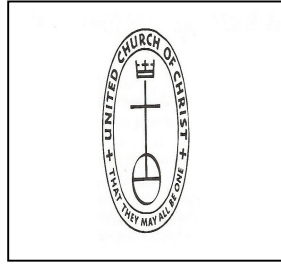

Voices From the Prairie:



"SAILING"

Had an opportunity to sail a very large sailboat belonging to a friend earlier this summer. (I guess it is now officially fall). This boat is 9 feet longer than ours, three times the weight and equipped like a modern day naval vessel with all the electronics my sailboat never dreamed of.

I made a discovery though. It still sailed the same, size was relevant to cost,

not necessarily to the knowledge and ability of the sailor at the helm. Interesting!

Think that maybe we judge our church and the ministry of our church relative to the size and cost? Businesses often do, why not the church? Sadly in our time spiritual leadership is judged in world standards of success, size, cost, and profit income.

I see very little of that perspective in the Gospels. In fact, that focus is often looked upon as quite contrary to Gospel teachings.

The large sailboat I was on didn't sail any faster nor did it lean to port or starboard any more or less than our seemingly smaller sailboat. It handled relative to the skill of the person at the helm. Perhaps that is what is important, the skill of the person at the helm.

Sailing means learning to be sensitive to the speed and gusts of the wind. The person at the helm "feels" their way across the lake in a stiff wind, in a sudden gust of unexpected wind, being able to "spill" wind by instantly adjusting the mainsail boom is so important to staying level and in control. I sail with one hand on the tiller and the other holding the line releasing the boom in a stiff, gusting wind.

How well are we able to adjust to the winds and storms of daily life? Perhaps keeping one hand on the tiller of the Gospel and the other holding the line (rope) of faith helps us to respond to those sudden unexpected gusts.

Sailing up Garrison Bay one evening with a friend, we sailed almost directly into a north wind but kept on course moving forward. My friend said, "How can this be possible? How can you sail into the wind: It defies my sense of logic."

My only response is simply that so does faith. Faith also defies one's sense of

logic. One hand on the tiller, one hand on the boom line, works every time.
